With great joy, we present to our readers this second issue of the journal *Revista Episteme*, which represents the consolidation of ten years of work and effort at the Villavicencio campus of the Universidad Santo Tomás. Thus, with this issue the editorial proposal that characterizes the journal becomes more solid: an opening in the different fields of Humanities and Social Sciences that allow an interdisciplinary dialogue, as well as in different regional, national and international scopes.

Therefore, the *Articles* section increased the number of contributions, from seven to nine. On this occasion, you will find contributions from philosophy with a methodological discussion that proposes an innovative approach to the relationship between neurosciences and theology, in the article “The method in research between theology and neurosciences”, by Vicente Valenzuela Osorio. Likewise, we present an interesting study of the understanding of knowledge in Karl Popper entitled “Metaphysical Theory of Popper's Three Worlds”, written by Juan Pablo Solarte Burbano.

Gender studies are a relevant topic today and our publication would not be complete without it, which is why we present the article “The new male bodies: theoretical reflection on identity changes in men within the framework of the postmodern cult of the body”, by Ismael Ocampo Bernasconi, who presents a contribution to think about masculinity.

Related to this theme, it is necessary to think about the violence found at different levels in our society. In this sense, we have the articles “Gender violence against women forcibly recruited in the field of the armed conflict: reparation and the right to justice within transitional justice”, by María Alejandra Borda González and Ángela Jackelyn Díaz Ricardo, and “Colombia y Mexico: a retrospective look at armed violence and drug trafficking in these nations, by Henry Ferrer Florián Delgadillo. Both articles provide an interesting discussion between violence, gender and drug trafficking. Likewise, studying this phenomenon in the school environment, we present “Bullying, school harassment. Definition, prevalence and proposals for action”, written by Miguel Urra Canales and Francisco Reyes Torres. In contrast to this panorama, there are alternatives of resistance originating from virtuality; one of them can be found in the article “Facebook as a platform for participation and integration of Venezuelan immigrants”, by the author Irama Flores.

This space also allows us to share experiences developed in our institution. Proof of this are the articles “University social responsibility: politicity of the Henri Didon chair from humanities”, by Juan Gabriel Bossa Bueno and William Alejandro Guevaro, and “Analysis of an emerging scientific journal from the fields of action of the university that publishes it”, written by Ginneth Esmeralda Narváez Jaimes and Laura Alejandra Urrego Gaitán.

Finally, we continue with our *Translations and Reviews* sections, this time with the paper “There is no invisible hand”, by the 2001 Nobel Prize in Economics Joseph Stiglitz, and a review of the film *Lord of War*, by the American Andrew Niccol, who provides an ethical reflection.

We hope these articles are to the liking of our readers, but above all that they contribute to the discussion and production of new ideas in Humanities and Social Sciences.
